

# Abstracts

## License to Publish

The following terms and conditions apply to the publication of abstracts for the **UK-PharmSci Conference 2010**. All authors should read them carefully.

- Authors are advised that by submitting an abstract for the UKPharmSci Conference 2010 they are also agreeing to accept this Licence, should the abstract be accepted for publication.
- You (the author(s) or other copyright owner) agree to grant the Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences of Great Britain (the publisher) the exclusive right to both reproduce and/or distribute your abstract ourselves throughout the world in printed, electronic or any other medium, and in turn to authorise others (including Reproduction Rights Organisations such as the Copyright Licensing Agency and the Copyright Clearance Centre) to do the same. You agree that we that we may publish your abstract and distribute it on its own or with other related material.
- You promise that the abstract is your original work and has not previously been published. You also promise that the article does not, to the best of your knowledge, contain anything that is libellous, illegal or infringes anyone's copyright or other rights. If the abstract contains material that is someone else's copyright, you have obtained the unrestricted permission of the copyright owner to use the material (enclose evidence of this) and that the material is clearly identified and acknowledged in the text.
- The Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences of Great Britain promises that we will respect your rights as the author(s). That is, we will make sure that your name(s) is/are always clearly associated with the abstract and, while you do allow us to make necessary editorial changes, we will not make any substantial alterations to your material without consulting you.
- The copyright remains yours, and the Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences of Great Britain will acknowledge this in the copyright line, which appears on your abstract. However, you authorise us to act on your behalf to defend your copyright if anyone should infringe it, and to retain half of any damage awarded after deducting our costs. You also retain the right to use your own abstract (provided you acknowledge the published original in standard bibliographic citation form) in the following ways as long as you do not sell it (or give it away) in ways which would conflict directly with our commercial business interests. You are free to use your abstract for the internal educational or other purposes of your own institution or company. You may mount the abstract on your own institution's website; and you may in whole or in part, use the abstract as the basis for your own further publications or spoken presentations.
